FriedlThe very first page of this book says "Cornfield Soldiers - Utah Beach to the Elbe River is a work of fiction", though they claim to pay attention to historical accuracy, it is nevertheless a novel. This is not noted anywhere on the product page.I don't know about the quality of the writing, because the Kindle formatting is the worst I've ever seen in the store. The introductory material was built electronically and merely given amateurish formatting, but the main text looked like it was scanned from hardcopy with very limited attention to cleaning it up. Line breaks in the middle of paragraphs; page numbers in the middle of sentences, bizarre uPpeR/loweR case mixups, sentences intermixed with each other, annoy-ing hypen-ation that didn't get clean-ed up, etc. Nobody on the production side could have tried reading this on a real Kindle.This book is unreadable. I interviewed three officers in the 238th before they died and all three said that my descriptions of officers and men in the book was accurate. While I understand why they might not like what I wrote, to my knowledge it's the truth. And as the first fifty pages not having nothing to do with the 238th Engineer Combat Battalion's experiences in combat - that's true. But those pages are necessary to introduce the the main characters. It's obvious to me that two of these negative reviews are an attempt to keep readers from finding out how a certain officer failed to lead during the opening days of the D-Day invasion.
