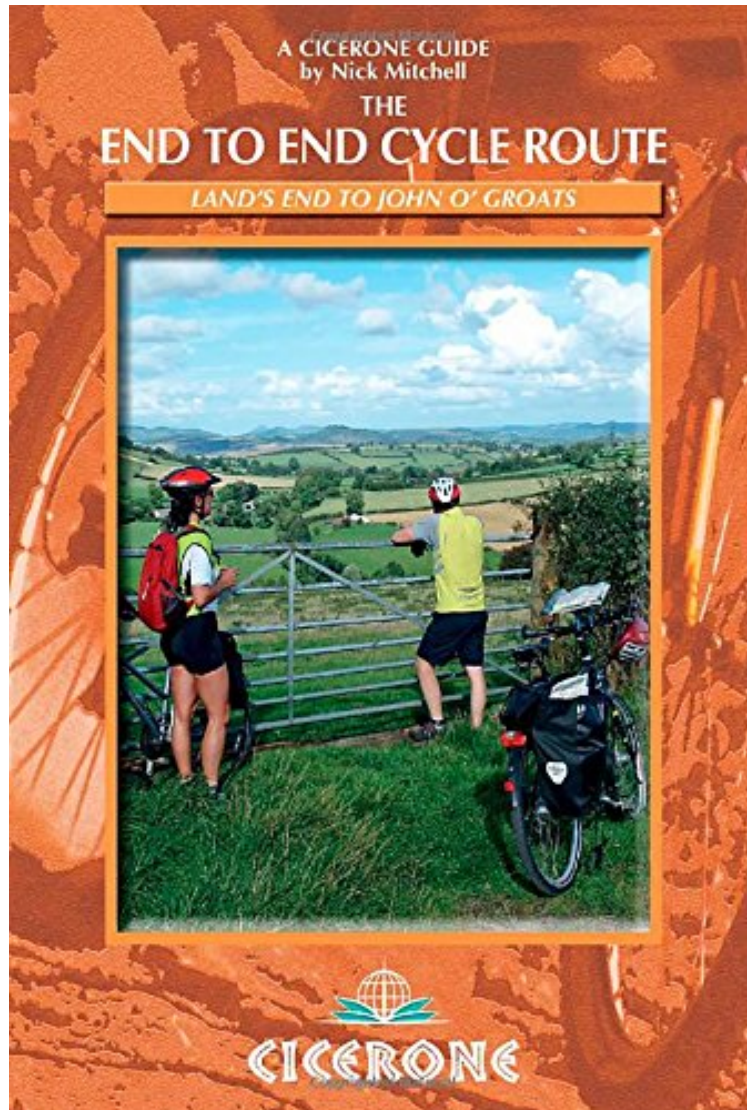

MayLike all the Cicerone books, Nick Mitchell's creation gives you everything you need to accomplish the trip, providing you don't want to make any changes in the route or the stages he suggests. Since most riders will want to

accomplish the trip in the 14 days of riding the book suggests, this is generally an advantage rather than a problem. If, however, you do wish to ride longer stages or shorter ones, it is easy to find lodgings on the Internet, perhaps, however, more expensive than the hostels mentioned in the book for most stages. Other routes, of course are also possible, as a quick look at the Sustrans map page will show you. Often, but not always, those routes are considerably longer, but may offer other advantages, for tourism, for example, or avoiding cities. Although Nick's book was written in 2012, already there are two important route changes not covered in the book: There is a new, highly preferable, cycle route open from Plymouth to Yelverton; and, unless you are comfortable riding in ever-heavier traffic that includes tour buses and lorries, one should now strongly consider avoiding A98 north of Alexandria (Loch Lomond), and take the longer National Cycle Route 7 north to Inverness. Whatever your ultimate riding decisions may be, in my opinion "The End to End Cycle Route" is an indispensable tool for setting up and executing your trip. 0 of 0 people found the following review helpful. By Bruce Like all the Cicerone guidebooks, this is a "pocket-size" piece that'll easily fit into your handlebar pack - which is good, because anybody doing the British ETE route would be well advised to have this guide with them when they do it. However - as is typical for Cicerone books - it gives you an excellent and detailed mile-by-mile, day-by-day description of the trip. Do note however that it covers only their suggested route. If you intend to do a lot of straying off their suggested route, also having a general British cycling guide would be a good idea. Nonetheless, this is a good book that does what its supposed to.

This handy pocket guidebook offers a detailed route description of an End to End cycle route from Land's End to John o' Groats, with over 350 OS grid refs included for GPS navigation. It is divided into 14 stages and contains information on where to stay, with full details of numerous BBs, campsites, cycle shops, small hotels, tourist information offices and hostels. The route has been designed to avoid the busier A roads as much as possible and follow minor roads and cycle paths. It also takes in some of the best landscapes of Britain from Dartmoor, the Wye Valley and the Welsh Marches, the Forest of Bowland, the Lake District through to the glorious Strathnaver Trail and the rugged coast of Caithness. Descriptions of key landmarks along the route are also included, from Tintern Abbey through to the Forth and Clyde Canal in Glasgow and beyond.
