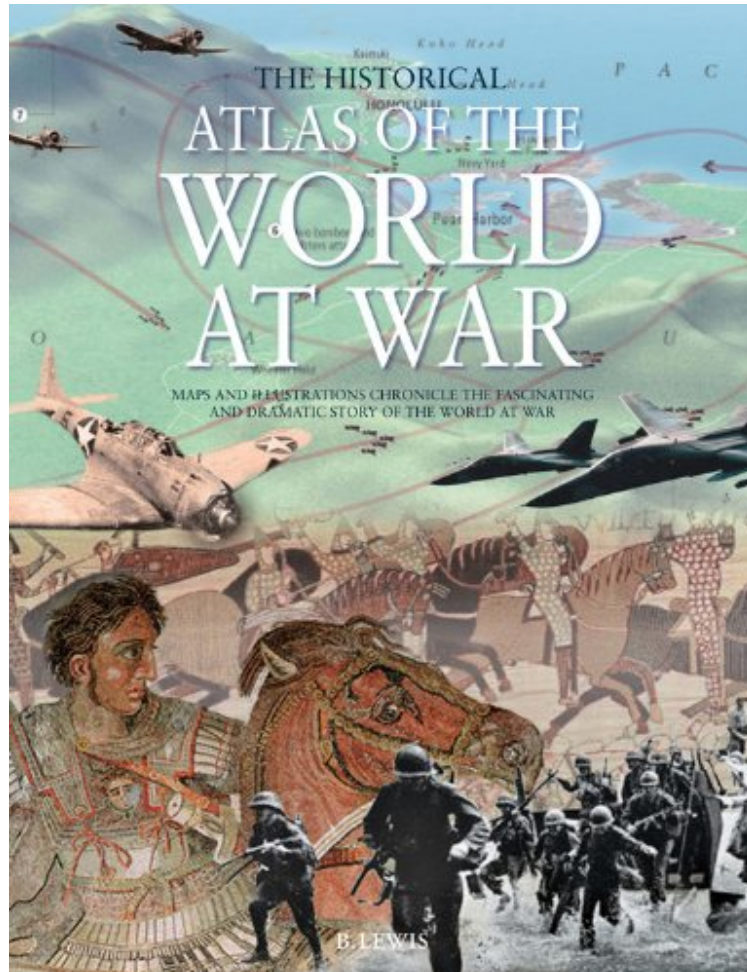

I don't know, but I do know that the coverage of the American Revolutionary War is next to useless. There is no text coverage of the years between 1777 and 1781, although there is a map with information about this time. It appears for all the world that one page of text and one map have been omitted. There needs to be a map for 1776 and 1777 opposite the text for this period, and there needs to be a page of text facing the page with the map for the war in the South. There is no mention of the battles of Cowpens and Kings Mountain which were the turning point of the Revolutionary War. Could the authors have been trying to trivialize the conflict because the UK lost the war? NevinsThere are large numbers of typographical errors, wildly incorrect dates and maps that are generally illegible and usually unconnected and unexplained. In short the editing job is really bad. I don't usually throw away books, especially historical books, but I'll make an exception here.
